

CPAM GRANTS



Every year, CPAM gets offers to help out our organization. This year, we had the **Winnipeg Watch Enthusiasts Group** approach us saying they wanted to help a member with an equipment grant. This group has over 250 members who have a shared love of vintage and unique watches (P.S. I found out my 1991 Casio didn't make the cut!).

So far, The Watch Enthusiasts have helped out two members in reaching for the stars. In **Coltyn's** case, (Coltyn is a member in Winkler), the funds raised helped to purchase a specialized bike from Germany. "The Duet" is a full wheelchair in the front and a bike in the back. The Duet allows Coltyn to travel in style and safely with his family or friend going for a bike ride. Coltyn needs the support and comfort that this bike brings.



Hockey in any form is still Canada's pastime. For any athlete you need proper equipment that fits and that fits your ability. Our member **Josh** outgrew the basic sledge that the SMD Program could provide. The Grants committee allocated some of the funds from the Watch Enthusiasts raised to get Josh a lightweight sledge.

"GAPS" IN SERVICES FOR ADULTS WITH DISABILITIES DISCUSSION RECAP

On March 21st, CPAM hosted a discussion on the "gaps" in services for adults with disabilities. The meeting was held in support of two members, Amy & Tyson, in conjunction with their human rights complaint. The Public Interest Law Centre is lead counsel in the complaint, with attorney Joëlle Pastora Sala heading the case.

The goals of the meeting were two-fold:

- 1) to share information about the human rights complaints that had been filed by Tyson Sylvester and Amy Hampton, as well as the broader campaign, which seeks to achieve social inclusion for all adults with physical disabilities in Manitoba.
- 2) to hear from individuals and families facing similar challenges about gaps in services, the potential solutions to address these gaps, and issues of priority.

The insights shared during this workshop relating to the gaps in service for adults with disabilities, and solutions for a way forward, are important and valuable to both the Cerebral Palsy Association and

the Public Interest Law Centre. We will be integrating the gaps and solutions in our strategic planning for moving forward with the human rights complaints, but also the activities of the CP Association more broadly. We will continue listening to other interested partners and individuals like you, as all of us are stronger than one of us.

We are looking at the following steps:

- a) Immediately - write to Deputy Ministers (Done)
- b) End of April 2017 - write to Premier if we don't hear anything from Deputy Ministers
- c) Early June 2017 - Engagement with service providers
- d) Mid to late June 2017 - Engagement with individuals and their families (round two)
- e) Summer 2017 - A campaign (social media, survey monkey etc.) on - "tell us your story"
- f) Fall 2017 - Raising awareness event: wine and cheese with politicians

The Challenger Baseball game is played in a safe, recreational environment where there are no strikes, no outs, no score to be kept and everyone's a winner!!! Each player will be provided with an able-bodied "Buddy" who are "mentors" to the Challenger players. Buddies assist with the player's involvement in the game, whether that be assisting players holding the bat and swing for a teed or pitched ball, running with or pushing their wheelchair around the bases, or even providing protection from a batted ball! Each player is registered as a player in a conventional Baseball Manitoba local sanctioned league and will be treated as such by being on a team, having a coach, be outfitted in a uniform and use the same equipment (with adaptations based on the player's individual abilities)!! Of course, just as in any other division, Team and Individual pictures are a must along with a party to finish the season AND a ceremony to receive that coveted team trophy!!! Last, but not least, smiles are plentiful and FREE! Everyone just has fun, isn't that what baseball is supposed to be about?

Behind the Music: The Benefits of Music Therapy

As a young child, part of me always wanted to grow up and become a Ninja. There was something so fascinating to me about their agility, stealth, immense skills, drive and zen-like calm. Now, one might say that I have abandoned that dream since more often than not I'm carrying bags of shakers, bells, and various other instruments with me, announcing my arrival long before you see me. However, I would like to take the time to explain how maybe, just maybe being a music therapist is the Ninja of the Allied Health team.

Music is motivating. Music is fun and engaging. People, children in particular, are naturally musical or at the very least respond to music. As a music therapist, I can use those natural aptitudes as the vehicle/tool to work on non-musical outcomes. Exemplifying the stealth of a good ninja, music therapy also operates behind the scenes. Often times my clients are working extremely hard in their sessions and they have no idea that it's work/therapy. Progress is made towards goals, while they see it as play, fun, and recreation.

The great thing about music therapy is that it is agile enough to work on multiple domains within therapy: speech/language, attention skills, executive functioning, academics, social, and fine/gross motor to name a few. A treatment plan is created based on assessments as well as interviews and is really individually tailored to meet each client where they are, their personal preference for music and includes their strengths into each session as much as their areas of focus.

Common misconceptions are: client needs to have a musical background; limited mobility excludes one from music therapy being an effective treatment modality and/or you have to learn how to play an instrument in music therapy. We believe that everyone can benefit from music, whether you have a background in it or not and no matter your age. In our state-of-the-art studio we have a variety of adapted equipment to allow for maximum creation no matter how limited one's mobility. While some families do have musical goals as part of their treatment plan, it is absolutely not required.
